CURRICULUM

STATEMENT OF BELIEFS

Given the mission of the University and the College of Nursing, our programs are grounded in a set of guiding principles shaped by the expertise and beliefs of our faculty. These principles underscore our commitment to:

- **The Core of Nursing:** Addressing human beings within the dynamic context of health.
- **Nursing as an Evidence-Based Profession:** Advancing high-quality practice rooted in research and best practices.
- **Nursing Education as Lifelong Growth:** Fostering a continuous commitment to learning, innovation, and adaptability.

These beliefs shape the foundation of the nursing education programs at Florida State University:

Foundational Preparation: Our programs emphasize a broad-based foundation in liberal studies, professional values, and the knowledge and skills needed for advanced practice at the baccalaureate and graduate levels. This foundation reflects our commitment to the standards of the AACN Essentials (2021), NONPF (2022), and the American College of Lifestyle Medicine (ACLM, 2025).

Nursing Knowledge Development: Nursing knowledge is an evolving blend of practice, theory, research, and interdisciplinary insights, adapting and applying relevant findings to professional practice. This integration supports students in all tracks: Clinical/NP, Executive Leadership, Education, and AI in Healthcare (AACN Essentials, 2021).

Unique Nursing Contributions: Nurses bring a distinct combination of knowledge, judgment, skills, and compassion to healthcare teams. Clinical and Nurse Practitioner (NP) students develop advanced clinical reasoning, judgment, and assessment skills, Executive Leadership students focus on strategic decision-making and organizational leadership (AONL Competencies, 2023), while Educator track students cultivate teaching expertise aligned with NLN Core Competencies (2020), and AI in Healthcare students learn to apply data-driven insights to improve care outcomes (AACN Essentials, 2021; NONPF, 2022).

Cultural Competency and Global Awareness: Nurses are prepared to deliver safe, culturally competent, and high-quality care in an increasingly diverse and interconnected world. This includes Executive and Clinical students focusing on equitable patient outcomes and AI track students advancing culturally sensitive innovations in healthcare delivery (AACN Essentials, 2021; NONPF 2022).

Commitment to Evidence-Based Practice: Nursing practice is grounded in scientific inquiry and is designed to expand the evidence base of the profession, enhancing both clinical and system-wide healthcare practices. This approach is fundamental for Clinical/NP, Leadership, and AI students who lead quality improvement, and for Educator students who translate research into effective educational practices (ACLM, AACN Essentials, 2021).

Baccalaureate as the Entry-Level Standard: Recognized as the minimal entry requirement for professional nursing, baccalaureate education prepares generalists and serves as the foundation for graduate education, leading to advanced roles and specialties in Clinical/NP, Leadership, Education, and AI fields (AACN Essentials, 2021).

Essential Aspects of Generalist Nursing Practice: Direct patient care, health promotion, disease prevention, and population health are core components of generalist nursing practice. For Clinical/NP students, this foundation is applied in advanced settings; for AI students, in data and technology integration to support care, and for Leadership and Educator students, in improving organizational and educational practices (AACN Essentials, 2021; NONPF, 2022).

Advanced and Specialized Graduate Education: Graduate education enhances professional practice, enabling Clinical/NP students to provide advanced care, Executive students to lead healthcare organizations effectively, Educator students to shape future practitioners, and AI students to integrate artificial intelligence and data analytics in healthcare (NONPF, 2022; AONL Competencies, 2023; NLN, 2020).

Interprofessional Collaboration and Patient-Centered Care: Nursing education prepares students to deliver patient-centered care as collaborative members of interprofessional teams. Clinical/NP students focus on comprehensive, patient-centered approaches, Leadership students on strategic health system partnerships, Educator students on fostering interprofessional understanding, and AI students on developing cross-disciplinary tech solutions for better care (AACN Essentials, 2021; AONL, 2023; National Academy of Medicine, 2023).

Lifestyle Medicine Integration: FSU is the first and only approved academic pathway for the American College of Lifestyle Medicine, reflecting our commitment to holistic, preventive care across all tracks. Clinical/NP students integrate these principles into patient care, Leadership students apply them in healthcare systems, Educator students incorporate them in curriculum, and AI students bring innovative lifestyle interventions to tech-enabled practice (ACLM, 2025).

This framework underscores FSU College of Nursing's commitment to excellence, preparing nurses not only as skilled professionals but as transformative leaders who advance the profession and positively impact patient and community health. We are proud to support our students' growth as they contribute to the evolving field of nursing in diverse and influential ways.

GRADUATE PROGRAM CONCEPTUAL MAP



The conceptual map of the graduate program consists of three major parts: the core circle, elliptical inner orbits, and the outer orbits. The graduate program is built upon core professional nursing values and life-long learning. An undergraduate baccalaureate degree in nursing is a mandatory criterion for entering the graduate program.

The center of the model depicts the lifelong learning in a culturally sensitive environment encircling Benner's Model of Novice to Expert (1984, 2004) depicting students' progression through the program and beyond graduation. Additionally, the core is based on evidence-based practice representing the knowledge content required for mastering, applying, and fine-tuning the concepts and processes students master as they move through the curriculum.

The orbits on the second layer indicate the seven majors or roles students may choose as a focus of their studies: family nurse practitioner (FNP), psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner (PMHNP), and acute care nurse practitioner (AGACNP), executive health systems leader (EHSL), lifestyle medicine professional (LM), nurse educator (NE), nursing artificial

intelligence (AI) specialists which include the various healthcare providers certificate programs.

The outer orbit depicts the major expected roles students will evidence as they move from novice to expert. These roles are expected of students in all curriculum tracks in the graduate program.

DOCTOR OF NURSING PRACTICE (DNP) PROGRAM

DNP Program Outcomes

The Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) degree is designed to prepare nurses for the highest level of clinical practice in the profession of nursing. The program is designed in accordance with the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) Essentials of Doctoral Education for Advanced Practice Nursing (2021), National Organization of Nurse Practitioner Faculty (NONPF) Core competencies (2022), along with the *NONPF Nurse Practitioner Role Core Competencies* (Population-focus nurse practitioner competencies (2022)).

The Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) degree is a terminal, practice-focused doctorate that prepares nurses to lead at the highest levels in clinical and executive roles. Per the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN, 2021) guidelines, all DNP students nationwide must complete a minimum of 1,000 post-baccalaureate clinical hours (direct and indirect) to qualify for degree conferral. Students bringing in clinical hours from prior programs will have their hours reviewed to determine eligible credit toward this requirement. Each specialized DNP track is designed to meet both these standards and the unique competencies required in advanced nursing practice.

DNP Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) BSN to DNP

This program is designed to prepare nurses for the highest level of clinical practice as Family Nurse Practitioners (FNP). The FNP curriculum follows the AACN Essentials of Doctoral Education for Advanced Practice Nursing (2021), the NONPF Core Competencies (2022), and Population Focus Nurse Practitioner Competencies (2022). Upon successful completion, graduates are eligible to sit for the FNP certification exam and will be awarded the DNP degree. MSN-DNP options are available, and students should refer to the FNP track-specific supplement for detailed track information.

MASTER OF SCIENCE IN NURSING (MSN) PROGRAM

The Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) degree is designed to prepare nurses for advanced practice roles in clinical, educational, and leadership settings within the nursing profession. The program is structured according to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) Essentials for advanced-level practice. This curriculum supports the development of critical thinking, evidence-based practice, and specialized knowledge, equipping graduates to excel in diverse healthcare environments and meet the evolving demands of the profession.

Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) in Nursing Education

The MSN in Nursing Education program is designed to cultivate expert nurse educators who will shape the future of nursing through teaching, leadership, and mentorship. Grounded in the National League for Nursing (NLN) Nurse Educator Competencies, this 40-credit program includes 500 clinical hours focused on hands-on teaching practice, curriculum design, and instructional innovation. Our graduates are equipped with advanced skills in educational theory, assessment, and technology integration, preparing them to effectively educate and inspire the next generation of nurses in academic, clinical, and community settings.

Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) in AI in Healthcare

As the first MSN program in the nation with a concentration in Artificial Intelligence (AI) in Healthcare, this 40-credit program with 500 clinical hours places FSU College of Nursing at the forefront of innovation in nursing education. Led by nationally recognized faculty who are pioneering the integration of AI, the MSN in AI in Healthcare prepares students to leverage data analytics, machine learning, and healthcare technology to enhance patient outcomes, optimize clinical workflows, and drive advancements in precision medicine. PROGRAMMATIC GUIDANCE

Overview of the FSU MSN-to-DNP Gap Analysis and Program of Study Determination

Students entering an MSN-to-DNP pathway bring varied graduate coursework, clinical experiences, and prior specialty preparation. Therefore, each student's Program of Study is individually tailored. This process ensures that prior graduate coursework and documented clinical experiences are accurately evaluated and appropriately applied toward DNP degree requirements.

Upon admission, the Student Services team initiates the review process by requesting official MSN transcripts, course syllabi (on appropriate) university template for any graduate courses the student wishes to have considered for waiver, and institutional documentation verifying all MSN and graduate certificate clinical or practicum hours. These materials are prioritized based on the sequencing of upcoming DNP courses to support timely evaluation and progression.

A comprehensive Gap Analysis is then completed by the appropriate DNP Track or Program Coordinator during the first, and when necessary, second semester of enrollment. Course waivers are determined at the discretion of the designated Track Coordinator in conjunction with the Assistant Dean of Graduate Studies. Course waivers are not guaranteed. This analysis determines:

1. Clinical Hour Reconciliation:

Documentation of clinical or practicum hours earned across applicable MSN and graduate certificate programs is reviewed to establish how many hours may be applied toward the 1,020-hour post-BSN DNP practice requirement. Students who enter with substantial prior graduate clinical hours must still complete all required DNP-level project and practicum experiences included in their approved Program of Study. At a minimum, the 120 DNP Project hours must be completed at FSU. Any additional post-master's clinical or practicum

hours required by the student's specific DNP track, concentration, or curriculum will be identified through the Gap Analysis.

2. Course Waiver Eligibility:

Students may request up to 12 credit hours of course waivers. To qualify, the student must provide the full syllabus for each MSN course under consideration. Courses such as Health Care Policy, Finance, Biostatistics, Population Health, or Social Determinants of Health may be eligible if the syllabus demonstrates substantial alignment with the required DNP course, including comparable learning outcomes, content, and major assignments.

3. Waiver of 3P Courses:

Students who have completed the required "3P's" (Advanced Health Assessment, Advanced Pathophysiology, and Advanced Pharmacology) may waive these courses in addition to other courses waived. To do so, students must provide a syllabus from the semester the course was taken. Syllabi must indicate that the course was at an advanced level and that it was across the lifespan.

The DNP Core courses that are not eligible for syllabus review include the following:

- NGR 6811 Theory and Evidence-Based Practice Scholarship
- NGR 6853 Translation of Evidence for Practice
- NGR 6931C DNP Project Planning & Application for the APN
- NGR 6935C DNP Project Implementation, Evaluation & Dissemination for the APN

Following the analysis, the appropriate DNP Track or Program Coordinator completes a formal Transfer Credit Evaluation form, identifying all courses approved for waiver and summarizing applicable prior clinical or practicum hours. This documentation, along with all supporting materials, is submitted to the Assistant Dean for Graduate Programs for final review and approval. The approved Gap Analysis then determines the student's individualized Program of Study, remaining course requirements, and required clinical or practicum hours for successful completion of the DNP degree.

Transfer of credit hours is limited by Florida State University. Six (6) credit hours may be accepted from another institution. This is increased to twelve (12) if the courses were taken at FSU. The waiving of the 3P courses is not counted toward this limit and may be waived with the qualifying syllabi and Track Coordinator approval.

SCHOLARLY ENGAGEMENT

The purpose of the Scholarly Engagement requirement is to ensure that doctoral students are active participants in the scholarly community. To meet the Scholarly Engagement requirement, doctoral students should interact with faculty and peers in ways that may include enrolling in courses; attending seminars, symposia, and conferences; engaging in collaborative study and research beyond the university campus; and utilizing the library, laboratories, and other facilities provided by the university. The goal is to prepare students to be scholars who can independently acquire, evaluate, and extend knowledge, as well as develop themselves as effective communicators and disseminators of knowledge.

PROGRESSION IN THE GRADUATE PROGRAM

Students in the graduate program are required to make a grade of “B” or better in all graduate nursing coursework. Additionally, nursing students are required to make a Satisfactory (S) in all graduate clinical courses. Any course grade below a “B” or “Unsatisfactory” cannot count toward the graduate degree. A student who fails to achieve a grade of “B” or better, or a Satisfactory in a clinical course is required to take the course again. If a student is unsuccessful in a clinical course, they must retake the course including retaking all required clinical hours for that course again. A student who fails to achieve a grade of “B” or better, or a Satisfactory in a clinical course a second time in a course cannot continue in the graduate program. Additionally, if a student receives less than a B or an Unsatisfactory in two courses the student will be dismissed from the program. If transfer or waived credits are accepted, they must be a B or better.

Seven-Year Timeline

The work for graduate nursing degrees must be completed within seven (7) years from the time the student first registers for graduate credit. Any graduate work transferred from another institution must have commenced not more than seven (7) years prior to completion of the degree for the credits to be applicable to the graduate nursing degree.

Registration for Final Term

For doctoral students and master's students in a thesis-type program, registration shall be required in the final term in which a degree requiring a thesis, dissertation, or treatise is granted. If a student does not make the manuscript final submission deadline for a given term but completes all degree requirements before the first day of the next term, it is possible to waive the registration requirement. To be eligible for this registration exemption, all degree requirements, including manuscript clearance, must be completed prior to the first day of the next term. If the student has not been enrolled for the previous two terms, readmission is required before registration.

Graduation

During the first two weeks of the term in which a student expects to receive a degree, application for graduation must be made with the Office of the Registrar, Graduation Section, (850.644.5850). An online application for graduation is available at

Academic Requirements

The Graduate Program seeks to maintain its academic integrity and that of its students in accordance with university graduate policies. Students in the College of Nursing graduate program are required to have a "B" (3.0) or better in all graduate nursing coursework. Any course grade below a "B" (3.0) cannot count toward the graduate degree. A student who fails to achieve a grade of "B" or better in a course is required to retake the course. A student who fails to achieve a grade of "B" or better a second time in a course cannot continue in the graduate program (CON Student Policy G-1).

In addition, students are required to maintain at least an 80% average on didactic exams and clinical SOAP notes to progress in the program. Graduate students must also maintain a 3.0 grade point average in all nursing coursework each semester. Failure to do so will result in the student being placed on academic probation. During the semester on probation, the student is expected to raise their Nursing GPA to 3.0 or higher. Inability to meet this expectation will require that the student be dismissed from the program.

Part 1: Computer System Specifications

Hardware:

Any computer that is older than 2 years will typically not be able to perform the tasks required to complete the program. Your computer needs to have full multimedia capabilities (sound, microphone, and web cam). Headphones or ear buds, web cam, and microphone will be required to access online presentations and to participate in online video conferencing sessions. An important part of your computer is having a plan for backing up your data. There are several inexpensive services (Dropbox, Mosy, Carbonite, etc.) that will ensure your important files are automatically backed up.

Software:

The University provides you with a free version of Microsoft Office 365 online with your @fsu.edu account. This page explains what is available and offers links to imports sites. There is also student version of Microsoft Office available for a discounted price and Google Docs is available for free. You will want to make sure you have an anti-virus program (Microsoft Security Essentials is free) and a program to remove malware (Super AntiSpyWare is free). Software is typically updated every month and you need to make sure you have the latest updates for your computer to function properly.

Internet Connection:

As a student, you are responsible for setting up an account with an Internet Service Provider (ISP), a company that provides the software and service necessary for accessing the Internet. If you are not comfortable troubleshooting problems on your computer, you will want to sign up with an ISP with a 24-hour help desk.

Internet Browsers:

It is highly recommended that you load at least two browsers on your computer. If you have problems accessing course material the first thing to do is try a different browser. GRADUATE TEACHING/RESEARCH ASSISTANTSHIPS**Teaching Assistants (TA) and Research/Graduate Assistants (GA)**

The College of Nursing offers Teaching Assistant (TA) and Graduate Assistant (GA) positions based on the availability of funds and open positions. Qualified students interested in becoming a TA or GA should contact the Assistant Dean of Graduate Programs to discuss requirements. Interested candidates must submit a written statement of interest and a current CV or resume to the Assistant Dean. - **General TA/GA Requirements**

- Must hold a BS degree in Nursing.
- Hold an active Florida RN license.
- Have recent clinical nursing experience.
- Be fully admitted to the DNP Program in the College of Nursing.
- Maintain good academic standing with a GPA of 3.0 or higher.

- Credit Enrollment: Students must be registered for a minimum of 9 credit hours to receive a traditional TA or GA position with a stipend. In cases where a student's specific skill set is needed to support the College of Nursing, a scholarship may be offered in place of a full assistantship, excluding a stipend.
- Attend orientations for the College of Nursing, clinical agencies, and their assigned courses, as well as any relevant term meetings.
- Confer weekly with their assigned faculty mentor.
- Adhere to FSU, College of Nursing, and course-specific policies and procedures.
- Additional Requirements for Teaching Assistants: Register for a minimum of 1 credit hour in NGR 5941L (Supervised Teaching) during their first semester of employment and participate in weekly seminars. Graduate Student Mentor Positions

The purpose of the clinical preceptor program is to provide the students with a professional role model whose guidance will enhance the attainment of student learning. 1. CON verifies that an FDLE/FBI Level II Background Screening has been completed for the student.
2. CON verifies that the student meets the clinical clearance requirements and able to start participating in the clinical experience.
3. Additionally, CON verifies that the student has completed the required drug screening, has personal health insurance, has professional liability insurance coverage, and proof of current, unencumbered Registered Nurse license in the United States.

Functions and Responsibilities of the Preceptor:

1. Participate in a preceptor orientation.
2. Function as a role model at the clinical site.
3. Orient the student to the agency/clinical site.
4. Assure safe nursing practice by supervising the student's performance of clinical skills.
5. Assist the student in identification and monitoring of available activities, which accomplish the clinical objectives.
6. Communicate verbally and in writing with the student and collaborate with the faculty regarding student performance.
7. Provide feedback to the nursing program regarding clinical activities for students and suggestions for curriculum/program development as needed.
8. Keep the faculty informed of student performance when needed or if any problems occur.
9. Participate in evaluation of the preceptor program as needed.

Functions and Responsibility of the Student:

1. Participate in the selection of a clinical practicum and preceptor, when appropriate.
2. Supply preceptor with a copy of the course syllabus.
3. Maintain accountability for her/his learning activities.
4. Prepare for each clinical experience as needed and expected.
5. Be accountable for nursing practice activities while in the clinical setting. Arrange with your preceptor your clinical schedule for the semester.
6. Share learning experiences in grand rounds, clinical seminars, and student/preceptor/faculty conferences.
7. Keep open communication with preceptor and faculty.

8. Keep all patient and agency information obtained during clinical experiences confidential.
9. Complete all required course assignments.
10. Complete evaluation of preceptor(s).
11. Complete written self-evaluation as outlined in the clinical course.
12. Participate in the evaluation by the preceptor and or faculty of your clinical experience.

Preceptor Tuition Waivers and Verification Letters

Preceptor Tuition Waivers and Verification Process

Since Summer 2021, FSU preceptors are eligible to receive a tuition waiver upon completion of 300 clinical precepting hours. If you are interested in obtaining a tuition waiver or a preceptor verification letter, please follow this [link to complete the survey](#).

Process for Tuition Waiver and Preceptor Verification

1. Survey Completion

- The Qualtrics survey provides two options: one to request a tuition waiver and one for preceptor verification. Preceptors may select one or both options as needed.
- Once submitted, Clinical Coordinator Katie Lambert will review the surveys, categorizing requests by waiver or verification.
- For verification letters, Katie will forward the necessary information to Dr. Kathleen Wilsonb, Assistant Dean for Graduate Programs, who will issue the letter. For tuition waiver requests, Katie will document the information on an Excel spreadsheet in the TEAMS platform for tracking.

2. Required Survey Information

- **Preceptor Information:** Full name, credentials, email, and clinic address.
- **Student Precepted:** Full name, course, semester/year, and hours precepted.
- **Anticipated Use of Tuition Waiver:** Indicate when you expect to utilize the waiver.

Eligibility: Only Florida residents qualify for tuition waivers, as outlined in [Florida Residency for Tuition Purposes Policy](#).

Certificate of Participation

After accumulating 300 precepting hours, preceptors can request a Certificate of Participation. This certificate entitles the holder to a tuition waiver for up to six credit hours in one term at any State University in Florida, including courses offered through continuing education. The holder is responsible for all applicable fees except the matriculation fee and must meet all Florida State University and State of Florida admission and registration policies.
